

## TO SELL LAKE ROLAND AREA

### City Will Reserve Only The Lake And Riparian Rights.

All the landed property the city owns at Lake Roland, amounting to about 70 acres, will be sold at public auction as soon as the details of the sale can be arranged by the Water Board and the Law Department. Only the lake and riparian rights along the watershed will be reserved by the city.

The Lake Roland water supply was abandoned after the completion of the filtration plant, and a few days ago the Board of Estimates authorized the Water Board to dispose of all its property in connection with the watershed, it developed yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the Water Board.
